Rohini Nilekani, Chairperson, Akshara Foundation and Araghyam Trust and Pratham Books opined that Bangalore had the worst urban model in the use of water. "We bring water from Cauvery, pollute it and send it back to the stream," she said adding that fresh water demand outstripping its availability should be addressed by integrated water management solutions like eco-sanitary toilets and rainwater harvesting.

Mr Shanth Kumar mentioned the exemplary work of Rajendra Singh in Rajasthan, Anna Hazare in Maharashtra and Shree Padre in Kasaragod in mobilising communities to rejuvenate their own water resources. He addressed these efforts as a step towards societal revolution.

Shangon Das Gupta, founder and executive director of CDL, said the effort of their development initiative in water issues is "to anchor their work with the media through direct research." Water, she observed, is invariably, a concern across the State.
